LETTERS FROM GRANDPA # 272

Dearest grandchild,

Today's letter will deal with the Scriptural admonition to "test everything". It is found in 1 Thessalonians, which is generally assumed to be Paul's first inspired letter. The context is: "Do not put out the Spirit's fire; do not treat prophecies with contempt. Test everything. Hold on to the good. Avoid every kind of evil" (1 Thess. 5:19-22). We are to welcome new prophetic revelations, but are to test everything. The world is full of deceivers who are like wolves in sheep's clothing. Consequently, we are not to accept any idea or teaching without testing it. The word translated here as "test" is "dokimazo" which is used with regard to the assaying of metals. Every sample of ore is to be carefully "tested". It could be valuable "gold" or it could be worthless "pyrite".

By way of illustration let us test this famous statement made by President J. F. Kennedy before the Irish Parliament June 28, 1963. Kennedy said: "You see things; and you say 'why?' But I dream of things that never were; and I say 'why not?'"

On this surface this looks like a wonderful statement, but let us "test" it. Let us examine it more closely. This quotation did not originate with Kennedy, it came from the play *Back to Methuselah* by George Bernard Shaw. According to Shaw this is what the devil said to tempt Eve. It was diabolical. Eve lived in a paradise where there was no bloodshed. The devil, however, dreamed of bloodshed. He didn't like peace and harmony. He dreamed of murder and me hem and said "why not?".

Shaw was himself a Fabian Socialist and also a staunch defender of Joseph Stalin. He felt that Stalin was justified in mass executions to keep his country safe from "exploiters and speculators". In 1933 Shaw wrote: "The unfortunate Commissar must shoot his own workers so he might more impressively ask the rest of the staff whether they yet grasped the fact that orders are meant to be executed". So Stalin dreamed of executing millions of his own people and George Bernard Shaw said: "Why not?" The estimates of Stalin's staggering death toll ranges from 20 million to 60 million. So the quotation "Why not?" needs to be tested. It needs to be considered in the context of who is saying it. The fact that Stalin dreamed of killing millions of his own citizens was not a good dream!

In 1925 Adolf Hitler wrote the book *Mein Kampf*, which means "My Struggle". In that book he advocated the "Big Lie" as a technique to deceive the masses. He felt that the bigger the lie the more apt it was to be believed because most people would reason that no one "could have the impudence to distort the truth so infamously". Hitler's dreams of killing millions were not good dreams either!

At the risk of alienating those who are dear to me, let me encourage you to "test" what you are told about climate change. Tom Harris wrote on Mar. 29, 2019 that "man made global warming is the biggest lie ever told!" An article by Mark Hendrickson from the Epoch Times (Oct. 19, 2018) concurs and charges that: "Senior IPCC official Ottmar Edenhofer has openly said, 'One has to free oneself from the illusion that international climate policy is environmental policy. Instead, climate change policy is about how we redistribute ... the world's wealth.'" So the anti-capitalist dreams of the IPCC involve "rapid and far-reaching" changes "in land, energy, industry, buildings, transports, and cities . . . all we have to do is eat a third less meat, move into smaller houses, use mass transit, and switch entirely from fossil fuels to renewables." Is this a good dream? Before saying "Why not?" we need to "test it" and ask "Why?"

In the 1970's the "scientific" rage was global cooling. In 1977 Time Magazine featured a penguin on it's cover with the words "How to Survive the Coming Ice Age". When the thermometer did not support global cooling the pendulum swung to global warming. When the thermometer didn't support global warming the "scientists" pivoted to "climate change". How ingenious! Now no matter what the weather is those who want to redistribute wealth can use "science" to prove their point. Before permanently parking our cars, grounding all airplanes, and killing all cows, we need to test this theory. We need to judicially ask "why?" instead of blindly saying "why not?"

One of the saddest aspects of the climate scare is the impact it has on children. Sadly, the fear mongers live differently from the children they indoctrinate. For example, in his State of the Union speech on Jan. 20, 2015 President Barack Obama said that climate change was the greatest threat facing future generations. Yet his own carbon footprint is gigantic. On May 13, 2015, for example, Barack and Michelle both flew to California, on the same day but on separate planes.
